## **Browning to Continue Serving as President of National Association**

**Baton Rouge, LA** – State Fire Marshal H. "Butch" Browning has been sworn in to serve a second year as President of the National Association of State Fire Marshals (NASFM). On July 27<sup>th</sup> at its annual membership meeting in Nashville, Tennessee the principal membership of NASFM elected Browning, by unanimous acclamation, as its association President. Browning previously served as the organization's Vice-President and Secretary-Treasurer and has served on the Board of Directors since 2010.

The principal membership of NASFM comprises of senior fire officials in the United States and their top deputies.
